

A cross-border estuary-wide partnership approach is needed to tackle the intertwining and wide-ranging threats to the Dee Estuary, ranging from recreational and water quality issues to the need for improved governance and increased community awareness of the amazing wildlife. Cheshire Wildlife Trust, on behalf of the Tidal Dee Catchment Partnership, submitted a National Lottery Heritage Grant stage 2 application in May 2021 for a project to address these issues.

As a coastal project spanning two countries and established by a Catchment Partnership - partnerships usually associated with delivering inland water related projects, the development of Our Dee Estuary has raised the profile of the Tidal Dee Catchment Partnership nationally amongst coastal and catchment partnerships alike and put the Dee Estuary 'on the map' across strategic networks. As such, the delivery of Our Dee Estuary will be a pioneering and nationally exciting and inspirational project.

Our Dee Estuary aims to:

- Create a nature-based sense of place around the Dee Estuary making it a greater part of more people's lives and a better place to live, work and play.
- Work with local communities, estuary users, visitors and other partners to ensure our natural heritage is better managed, better recorded, better interpreted and in better condition.
- Improve access gateways and opportunities, breaking down barriers and making it easier for local communities and visitors to spend time enjoying the Dee Estuary without putting the heritage at risk.
- Provide opportunities for lifelong learning and training, enabling more and a wider range of people to develop new skills and ensuring that the rich heritage of the area is better understood by all.
- Empower a diverse range of people from across the target audience area to become Dee Champions, reducing negative environmental impacts and engendering a culture of stewardship and a lasting legacy.

Our Shared Vision

Our Dee Estuary is about connecting coastal communities of the Dee Estuary (Wirral, Cheshire West and Chester, Flintshire and Denbighshire) with their natural heritage to create a new community of stewardship to protect the unique and spectacular coastal natural heritage. The community will be defined by a nature-based sense of place, one shaped by joyous experiences and a deep understanding of the estuary's wildlife and that drives a passion to protect it.

A nature-based sense of place for the Dee Estuary

- A place without boundaries and where a mutual sense of place and a community of stewardship can be forged by highlighting and reflecting aspects of their shared interest and experience. Communities of different backgrounds and cultures connect around the common approach to caring for the diverse and fragile nature.
- A place of many diverse parts managed as a whole, regardless of place or politics through cross-boundary and collaborative working among organisations and groups around the estuary. Decisions put nature first and help people to take the right actions for wildlife. United estuary governance and connected management ensures a sustainable legacy for wildlife in the estuary.
- A place where people find joy in wildlife and seek relationship through deep understanding of it.


 People see it as a privilege and responsibility to share their lives with this diverse wildlife and consider the impact of their enjoyment and use of the estuary.

Project Area

The Our Dee Estuary project is defined by water, wildlife and the local communities. The Project Area is therefore the Tidal Dee catchment, reflecting the water catchment influence on the estuary, and added to this are areas of the Dee Estuary European Marine Site at the mouth of the Dee Estuary which are important for wildlife.

The project will take an estuary-wide approach, but there are particular areas of focus for on-the-ground activities which are either of high importance for wildlife, or where audience concentrations exist (honeypots), or both. Often a honeypot site is a wildlife hotspot on the estuary, which makes these locations the ideal places to focus our project activities. Six Project Focus Areas have been identified and they are:

- 1. Gronant Dunes and Talacre Warren
- 2. Flint Shoreline (Greenfield, Bagillt, Flint)
- 3. Deeside Wetlands (Connah's Quay and Shotton)
- 4. Neston Marshes
- 5. Thurstaston Shore
- 6. Hoylake and West Kirby Beaches

The Workstreams

Activities in Our Dee Estuary will be delivered through three workstreams – Love my Estuary, Coastlives and One Estuary. Each of these will deliver a different element of the project, but each has a critical role in delivering the overall Vision of Our Dee Estuary. Cross cutting the workstreams are Dee Champions, people fundamental to the success of the project and maintaining long-term benefits. Dee Estuary Traineeships will have the opportunity to volunteer alongside the project team and build key skills and experience that will help progress their career aspirations.

		 Launch a Dee Estuary website – an online gateway where people can discover more about the Dee Estuary. Bring the wildlife to people by recording wildlife at inaccessible locations and creating quality digital resources and showcasing this through communication channels and events. Deliver an exciting acoustic project working with University of Manchester social anthropology specialists. Practical access work to manage the impact of visitors and help a wider range of people enjoy the estuary. Share estuary-wide and local trail information to reduce visitor pressure on key sites and to provide more information for those wanting to explore their coast. Targeted on-site interpretation. Series of events to celebrate and learn about the Dee Estuary.

Create short film upon programme completion to share back, celebrate the success of the programme and inspire further engagement.
