





## Ponds

One of the best things you can do for wildlife is put a pond in your space. It can be as small as a bowl sunk into the ground! You could use a washing up bowl, an old storage box or even an old barrel. See what you can get your hands on for free!

#### How to build a mini wildlife pond





- \* Is there anything that you can upcycle? It could be an old washing-up bowl, sink or even a plant pot. Aim for 20-30cm deep.

- (1) Choose a spot. Your pond will need light, but not full sunlight all day. You can dig a hole and sink your container, or just have it sitting on top.
- (2) If the container isn't watertight e.q. an old plant pot, then add a piece of pond liner.
  - One vertical growing plant that reaches out of the water e.g.flowering rush
- (3) Add a layer of gravel and rocks.
  - (4) Fill your pond with rainwater (tap water contains chemicals).
  - (5) Start planting... you only need two or three plants.
  - Now watch and wait! Wildlife will come to your pand of its own accord.

Don't introduce frogs, fish or even water from another pond as this can spread disease.



#### Seed sowing

Start seeds in old toilet rolls or egg boxes. You can plant the whole container straight into the ground and the card will break down as the plant grows.

#### Get creative

Get creative with old tyres! Lay them on the ground and plant inside them, or you could stand them up or mount them on a wall.

#### Personalised pots

Tin cans make great pots, and the metal is thin enough to punch holes in using a nail and hammer.

Personalise them by painting them fun colours!









## Pallets


Wooden pallets can create some stylish features in your space.

Remember, if using power tools, ensure you are using them safely and using the correct personal protective equipment.

Stack pallets and fill them with materials to create a bug hotel. Make sure you use a variety of materials to create different sized holes and hiding places for different insects. This could include bark, logs, straw, sticks and bamboo canes.



Pallets have the perfect sized spaces for planting in-between. Lay it on the ground and create a mini raised bed. The slats also act as a perfect place to rest your tools while you work.



Find pallets on local sell and seek sites, websites such as gumtree and Freecycle, and at local builders merchants.



## Mini greenhouses

For a lot of us, greenhouses are out of our budget and take up lots of space.

Did you know, when moving seedlings from the indoors to the outdoors, you are best to get the plant used to colder temperatures in a greenhouse first before planting them outside.

Below are some examples of ways to create the warm, humid environment of a greenhouse using everyday objects such as umbrellas, plastic containers, and water bottles.







# Where do I get my materials from?

- Local sell and seek groups on Facebook, or Facebook marketplace are great places to find materials.
- Freecycle.org is a site where people give away items and plants for free.
- Gumtree is a site where you can buy secondhand items.
- Local builders merchants, DIY stores and garden centres often have offcuts and slightly damaged items that they're discarding.
- Some local tips have recycling centres selling salvaged items for a small price.
- Skips and sides of the road are sometimes good places to look but remember to stay safe and always gain permission from the owner before taking anything.

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
